

We want children to be SAFE, HAPPY and EMPOWERED.

We support and respect all children, as well as our staff and volunteers.

We are committed to the safety, participation and empowerment of all children.

We are committed to the cultural safety of Aboriginal children, the cultural safety of children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds, and to providing a safe environment for children with a disability.

We have zero tolerance of child abuse, and all allegations and safety concerns will be treated very seriously and consistently with our robust policies and procedures.

We have legal and moral obligations to contact authorities when we are worried about a child's safety, which we follow rigorously.

Kensington Neighbourhood House is committed to preventing child abuse and identifying risks early, and removing and reducing these risks.

We have robust human resources and recruitment practices to reduce the risk of child abuse by new and existing board members, staff and volunteers.

We are committed to regularly training and educating our board members, staff and volunteers on child abuse risks.

We have specific policies and procedures in place that support our board members, staff and volunteers to achieve these commitments.

It is EVERYBODY's responsibility to keep children safe.

KNH prioritises the safety and wellbeing of children and young people and strives to create a culture where the safety of children is promoted, child abuse is prevented, and allegations of child abuse are taken seriously and acted upon.

 Foundation's Enabling Education grant and our valued partners, is

- Learn Local Awards with Sew & Grow: We proudly took home the Pre-Accredited Program category at the 2023 Learn Local Awards, with Ayan Daher winning in the Pre-Accredited Learner category. These achievements reflect our commitment to providing accessible and highquality education opportunities to all members of our community.
- Kensington Reconciliation Group: Under the leadership of our marvellous Community Development Coordinator Esther Sadek, in partnership with Kensington Community Childcare Cooperative, Unison Housing, and The Venny, our reconciliation action plan is making meaningful progress. We are actively fostering reconciliation and building stronger connections within our community.

I am incredibly proud that our Board steadfastly supported the KNH statement in support of the Voice. While our desired outcome was not achieved, I remain hopeful for the future and our continued advocacy efforts.

People were keen to connect and re-join community activities and our participant numbers finally returned to pre-pandemic levels. Pleasingly, 380 brand new people visited KNH last year. Hopefully we will see many of them back engaging in activities in 2024.

Pages 7-11 of this report detail the huge array of initiatives undertaken during the year. I'm always surprised by how much this small organisation manages to achieve.

- Seeing our intergenerational art project "From The HeART" unfold was a personal highlight. The conversations between young and not-so-young participants were priceless (and I love watching all the people stopping to play with the cog wheels on our front fence).
- The establishment of the Debney Meadows Community Hub was a major achievement in 2023. Hats off to Freyja Dixon and Amran Guleid for their work on this one. It is a beautiful example of collaborative community work.
- Kudos also to Esther Sadek and the Kensington Reconciliation Action
 Group for their dedicated focus this year. From smoking ceremonies to
 information sessions and film screenings, they worked hard to bring
 reconciliation to the fore. We were all devastated by the outcome of the
 2023 Referendum but will continue to work towards meaningful
 reconciliation in our neighbourhood.
- Last but not least, congratulations to Marg Bergin and the Sew & Grow volunteers for their magnificent win at the 2023 Learn Local Awards. It was a pleasure to also see student, Ayan Daher, recognised for her outstanding achievements.

As always, none of this work would be possible without the incredible staff, volunteers and contractors who bring their best selves to our house week after week. In the 2023 KNH Participant Survey, the words "welcoming", "friendly" and "community" were by far the most frequently used. This is testament to the quality of every person working here. It's an absolute pleasure to be part of such a great team.

Special thanks also to Chairperson, Pia Robson-Garth, who is stepping down from the KNH Board having completed her maximum 6 year term. Pia began volunteering with KNH way back in 2015 when she signed up as a Study Support tutor. After another couple of years volunteering in Code Club, we enticed her onto the Board in 2018. Pia's guidance and input will be greatly missed. I am particularly grateful to her for convening the KNH Policy Working Group – helping us to improve the quality and efficiency of our policy review process. Thanks Pia – it was a tough job but someone had to do it!

In 2023 we also said farewell to Michelle Welsh after 6 years of service to KNH. Michelle's management experience was invaluable. She provided unfailing guidance through significant organisational change in 2021, all whilst retaining good humour and calm.

programs, activities & highlights

PROGRAMS

- 902 individual people enrolled in KNH programs. An increase of 15% on last year. This is back in line with pre-pandemic house activity. 380 of these participants were new visitors to KNH.
- There were 1,775 program enrolments across the year.
- English & Workskills and Beginners Computer classes continued steadily throughout 2023.
- A brand new Community Canteen course was introduced at the Debney Meadows Hub – providing work readiness skills in the context of planning a school canteen.
- All ACFE-funded pre-accredited training courses ran as planned, meaning that we exceeded our delivery hours for the first time since 2019.
- Sew & Grow, introduced in 2022, was expanded to include an additional project based learning course.
- Social groups for seniors Tuesday Movie Night, Wednesday Lunch & Bingo, Vietnamese Seniors and Threading Stories – ran all year with great attendance levels and many new members.
- Study Support and Strong Foundations reached new highs with up to 60 children attending over the year. With assistance from Community Bank Seddon, the Strong Foundations children went on an amazing school holiday excursion to the Museum of Play & Art.
- We offered 30 weekend/evening workshops over the year, employing multiple specialist facilitators.
- The "Kensingers" community choir gained multiple new members and finished the year with a great performance at the Kensington Chamber Players Benefit

- Healthy Living & Learning continued to provide a weekly sit-down meal for up to 50 residents of the Kensington estate. In addition to a meal, approximately 70kg of fresh produce was distributed each week. Gentle exercise, info sessions, and tech help were also provided as part of the program.
- A Women's Stretch & Strength class was added to our exercise timetable. We now offer low cost, accessible exercise classes three mornings a week.
- The Creative Art For Kids participants organised a great Art Show at the end of the year and also provided work for display at Kensington Station.
- The McCracken Street Food Share Pantry continued to thrive. Approximately 4,650kg of food was procured from Foodbank and a further 6,200 items were donated by residents. 17 local businesses are now supporting the pantry
- Our Form Help program was once again highly subscribed. Volunteers provided almost 300 individual support sessions across the year.
- Working with Kensington Community Children's Cooperative (KCCC) allowed us to run a number of intergenerational activities – including children participating in a board games morning, attending Wednesday Lunch & Bingo and a Gentle Exercise session.
- Freyja Dixon and Jane Farrell participated in the ACFE PQF Plus pilot program – helping to review new course framework and tools for the Learn Local sector.
- KNH secured funding to continue the Kensington Community Fresh Food Market – delivering 12 markets across the year, increasing access to locally grown fresh



INNOVATION & EXCELLENCE

- KNH released a strong and meaningful statement of support for a Yes vote in the 2023 Referendum. This statement was adopted by others in the sector.
- Our early years literacy program Strong Foundations - was featured as a best practice case study in the CMY publication, "Ages & Stages -Differentiation in Out Of School Hours Learning Support Programs"
- Strong Foundations also reached the finals of the 2023 MY Education Awards.
 Students, Zayd (Year 11) and Ezra (Grade 6) were finalists in their age categories and Ezra delivered an excellent speech at the awards ceremony.
- The Kensington Community Fresh Food Market featured in "A Community-Led Approach To Climate Justice", published by the City of Melbourne.
- The KNH Board developed and endorsed a Procurement Policy based on the Victorian Government Purchasing Board (VGPB) guidelines. This policy will greatly assist with assessment of tenders for building work in 2024.
- Education Manager, Freyja Dixon, presented at the 2023 Learn Local Marketplace. She focused on the Debney Meadows Community Hub as an extension of our family-learning approach to adult education.
- The Debney Meadows Community Hub was recognised with a Highly Commended certificate at the 2023 Victorian Multicultural Excellence Awards.
- Green Time Not Screen Time was shortlisted in the Community Wellbeing category of the 2024 NH Vic Awards.
- We ended the year on a high note with Sew & Grow winning the 2023 Victorian Learn Local Pre-accredited Program Award (for small providers). Student, Ayan Daher, took home the Ro Allen Award, recognising her outstanding learning achievements.

PARTNERSHIPS

- KNH and Debney Meadows Primary School entered into a formal partnership for the delivery of the Debney Meadows Community Hub project.
- A partnership with Cultivating Community and William Angliss Institute allowed 12 Community Canteen participants to complete their Food Handling Certificates.
- We partnered with Melbourne University to place Masters of Education Students as tutors within Study Support. These placement students also developed learning resources for the program.
- A "Waste Wisdoms" project at the Kensington estate was run in partnership with Unison, The Venny, Transition Town Kensington, and the Kensington Repair Hub. This work was supported by Sustainability Victoria.
- A new partnership with the Centre For Italian Studies was established to offer Italian language classes locally.
- We also hosted St Mary's Coptic Church regularly throughout 2023 while their new building was under construction.
- Rotary International ran Mental Health First Aid from KNH for multiple community members working with young people.
- Inner Melbourne Community Legal Centre assisted us with an excellent PD session for volunteers focused on citizenship applications.
- It was wonderful to partner with Holy Rosary Primary School to deliver sessions on child safety to their Grade 3 and 4 students. Over 60 children visited KNH to talk about keeping kids safe in community settings.
- We are working with researchers from RMIT and NH Victoria on a study of how neighbourhood houses combat social isolation.



PARTNERSHIPS CONT.

- We were very pleased to continue our successful Reconnect Consortium with Wingate Avenue Community Centre and North Melbourne Language & Learning. Reconnect is a vital service for supporting disadvantaged learners.
- KNH partnered with the Moonee Valley LLEN to provide a 10 week work placement for a young person.
- Over the 2023 year, KNH hosted visits from NH Vic interns and Network West members.
- KNH lead the review of the Kensington Community Network Action Plan, facilitating identification of ongoing and new community priorities
- KNH assisted the City of Melbourne with multiple community consultations including the Chemsford Street redevelopment.

FACILITIES

- Painting of foyer doors, trims and stairwell was completed with help from a grant from DJSIR.
- The same grant allowed the purchase of 14 new laptops for digital literacy programs.
- Our ancient gas hot water unit died midyear and was replaced with an electric heat pump system. We are now very close to switching off gas completely.
- Planning commenced for a much-needed renovation of the downstairs kitchen and bathroom areas. Many thanks to Visionary Design Developments for this work. We hope to complete the renovation in 2024.

ORGANISATION

- KNH was lucky enough to be one of 24
 neighbourhood houses selected to receive
 a \$40K election pledge following the State
 Election. This enabled the continuation of
 multiple un-funded programs.
- A Local History Grant was secured from the Public Records Office Victoria. This will allow us to catalogue and digitise the KNH historic archives during 2024.
- We participated in the second year of CMY's "Seat At The Table" program, hosting two young women of colour as Board Observers for 12 months.
- KNH introduced a new Child Safety & Wellbeing Policy along with a new Child Protection Policy – firmly committing to child safety across all programs.
- Multiple staff and volunteers completed Child Safe Training with the Centre For Multicultural Youth
- Education Manager, Freyja Dixon, attended the World Community Development Conference in Darwin – bringing back many ideas for family-centred learning.
- Our Tuesday Morning Playgroup thrived in 2023, growing to encompass children, parents and grandparents. It also supported mothers attending Sew & Grow, providing child minding while they studied.
- KNH continued to co-convene the Kensington Community Network (KCN) and the Inner West Children & Youth Network – meeting regularly throughout the year.
- We were supported by over 60 volunteers, contributing to a huge range of programs
- The results of the 2023 participant survey emphasised the important role KNH plays in the neighbourhood and that we continue to meet community needs.



ADVOCACY

- KNH wrote a submission to the Select Committee on Cost of Living Enquiry. We focused on digital inclusion and the cost of telecommunications for marginalised residents.
- We assisted with student submissions to the Parliamentary Inquiry Into the 2022 Victorian Flood Events.
- Community Agencies For Digital Inclusion (CADI) continued to operate in 2023 with KNH as an active member.
- KNH worked in partnership with the Kensington Reconciliation Group to advocate for the temporary removal of, and ongoing discussion about, problematic honour boards at the Kensington Town Hall.

- KNH issued a clear "Statement In Support Of The Yes Vote" early in 2023
- We ran information sessions on the Voice to Parliament in KNH programs.
- We "Changed It Ourselves" choosing to work on 26th Jan and observe an Australia Day holiday on a different date.
- KNH facilitated the Kensington Reconciliation Action Group (KRAG), with monthly meetings at KNH.
- We supported the KRAG to get a City of Melbourne \$2k small neighbourhoods grant for event work.
- In collaboration with the KRAG we ran the following events;
 - A Friends of the Yes campaign for the Voice to Parliament Morning tea during Reconciliation Week
 - A screening of "Still We Rise", followed by a Q&A session with the director, attended by over 30 people



special projects

Debney Meadows Community Hub - Year 1 - Laying the foundations

The Debney Meadows Community Hub (the Hub) is an exciting four-year initiative focused on whole-of-family learning. In collaboration with Debney Meadows Primary School (DMPS) and multiple other community organisations, we have established a community hub at the school. The Hub connects parents and their young children with each other and their school through a variety of activities and programs. The Hub strengthens intercultural capability and celebrates diversity by creating opportunities for people to learn, share and celebrate together. It supports settlement outcomes by providing culturally appropriate case work in a safe, trusted environment – connecting school community members with the help they need, including maternal & child health, housing, NDIS and mental health services. This year we focused on establishing The Hub – making capital improvements, introducing a tri-lingual Hub Coordinator, and developing a suite of programs to support parents and children. The Hub has been made possible through the William Buckland Foundation's Enabling Education Grant.



From The HeART

Over 120 people aged from 3 to 80 joined together to create an amazing community art work. Community artist, Jennifer Tran, facilitated groups of up to 20 people at a time who designed and painted multiple cog wheels – each cog representing either their present, their past or their future. This intergenerational project generated some wonderful discussion, lots of laughter and new connections. It was just the antidote we needed after the isolation of the pandemic.

Our thanks to the City of Melbourne for supporting this project with a Connected Communities Grant.



volunteers of the year

"Just do it online." Easier said than done! With core services increasingly moving to remote delivery, many community members are digitally excluded from participation in daily life.

For years, we have seen an increasing need for "life support". People needing help to manage their online access to housing, health, education, employment, immigration and more.

The KNH Form Help Program is our response to this need. Form Help began as a small service where volunteers would assist people to fill out paperwork such as passport applications and Centrelink forms. It was designed for people with limited English. When the program began in 2014, we had 1 volunteer and provided 26 appointments annually. In 2023 we provided almost 300 appointments! Each booking is one hour. Participants are no longer only from migrant communities. Increasingly we see Australian-born community members who do not have the digital literacy to perform essential tasks.

Every week, our amazing Form Help Volunteers turn up for their regular shifts. For two hours each, they sit with people and support them to complete whatever it is that needs doing. A form is never just a form – there is always a story behind it. Our Form Help team are willing to listen to that story. They are incredibly patient and they are experts at problem solving. They will often making multiple appointments with the same person to ensure that a task gets completed properly.

Over the year, these volunteers helped enrol children in schools, submitted dozens of citizenship applications, completed passport applications for entire families, helped people claim Power Saver Bonuses, apply for jobs, police checks and working with children checks. They have also spent HOURS on the phone to Centrelink, the Immigration Department and Births Deaths & Marriages - advocating on behalf of community members.

In a perfect world, we would not need a program like Form Help, but in our imperfect world, we are very grateful for this beautiful bunch of humans. Each one of them makes a difference – one person at a time.

treasurer's report

The Kensington Neighbourhood House has achieved a positive financial result in 2023, while also expanding the range of programs it provides.

At the end of the year, the House generated a better than forecast surplus of \$15,489. This is attributable to higher than expected grant income and strong take-up of our activities –documented in detail elsewhere in the annual report – offset by increased expenditure on staffing to support the diverse programs on offer.

Overall, the Neighbourhood House is in a strong financial position, readily able to cover costs, while also having sufficient reserves for future eventualities. In the foreseeable future – thanks to these reserves – it is possible to fund planned building renovations in 2024 without any adverse financial effect on operational activities being anticipated.

The accounts have been audited by Collins and Co. Audit Pty. Ltd., who have concluded that the KNH finances comply with the appropriate accounting standards, and the financial report is a true and fair representation of the House's financial position as at the end of 2023.

Regrettably, this will be my final year as both Treasurer and a Board Member of the Kensington Neighbourhood House. I want to express my thanks to past and current Chairpersons, the Board, and to Rebecca and the KNH team for the opportunity to play a part in its progress.
